Violence is not inextricably bound up with death, and death is by no means apolitical save from under Arendt's rather specific and monist conception of the political. More potent, perhaps, is Arendt's third distinction, on the silencing effect of violence. Arendt is skeptical of violence's ability to be or produce speech.

Arendt writes that "In a head-on clash between violence and power, the outcome is hardly in doubt." Violence: the view of Hannah Arendt

Arendt notes that the view that power is violence-awaiting-its-moment is consistent with the political arguments for the absolute right of kings, the rule of oligarchies, or the rule of the best or the most (aristocracy or democracy) or the rule of bureaucracy (which Arendt characterizes as the rule of nobody, since every bureaucrat ultimately passes responsibility to another).
