Characters - Stolen Having an identity that is in-between black and white is one typical effect of the assimilation policy on individuals, most clearly evident in Stolen in the character of Anne. In contrast, Jimmy and Sandy locate themselves much more at odds with white society, though nor are they represented as identifying strongly with any Aboriginal community.
